Message From the President, Peter Herscovitch

Dear ISCBFM members,

We were saddened this past summer to learn of the untimely death of our friend and colleague, Dale Pelligrino. Dale was a productive neuroscientist in our field, working for over 20 years at the University of Illinois-Chicago where he was Research Professor in the Department of Anesthesiology. He was an active member of ISCBFM, to which he made many contributions; he was the organizer of the BRAIN99 meeting in Chicago, and served as Secretary of the Society for several years. We will all miss him. A full obituary is provided below.

BRAIN17 Update

Planning for BRAIN/BRAINPET 17 in Berlin, April 1-4 is progressing under the leadership of Fahmeed Hyder, chair of the Program Committee. Several educational courses are planned for April 1, and there will be 11 symposia during the meeting; these are listed at http://www.brain2017.net/program/.

More time has been set aside for oral presentations and poster viewing. The Presidential Lecture will be given by Bill Jagust from UC Berkeley on "Tracking the molecular pathology of Alzheimer's Disease with PET". The Plenary Lecture by Malcolm Macleod of Edinburgh is entitled "Improving research quality: How stroke has led the world (and what we need to do to stay ahead)".



The General Assembly of members will be held during lunch on April I. Lunch boxes will be provided for every one. Please plan to attend; there will be the announcement of election results for President-elect, Secretary, and Board members, a budget update from our Treasurer Jun Chen, and discussion of amendments to our bylaws.

After many years of absence, there will be satellite meetings associated with BRAIN17.

These include:

- COSBID: Co-Operative Studies on Brain Injury Depolarizations
- German Competence Network Stroke - 7th "Clinical Stroke Academy"
- Cerebral Autoregulation Research Network (CARnet)

More information will be posted on the BRAIN17 website as it becomes available.

Note that the BRAIN meeting is earlier in the year than in the

past. The Abstract deadline is November 1. It is not too early to register for the meeting and to make your travel plans.

Future BRAIN Meetings

While we are looking forward to BRAIN17, we are also planning for future BRAIN meetings. BRAIN19 will be held in Yokahama, Japan with Prof. Hiroyuki Kinouchi as the local organizer. We will soon be soliciting bids for BRAIN21. According to the rotation among continents that we use, we will be seeking bids from North America. More information will be available on our website.

Membership Dues

At the suggestion of our Membership Committee chaired by Bill Pearce, the Board of Directors has voted to decrease dues from \$148 to \$50, starting with the 2017 membership year. Membership benefits remain unchanged. We hope this will promote membership retention and growth. Special arrangements will be made for those who have already paid 2017 dues in advance. You will soon be receiving your renewal notice with a link for easy processing.

This is not a new committee, but a new name for what was the Young Investigators' Committee. It was felt that this group should be redefined: rather than being based on age, it should reflect

career stage and the many, often lengthy, paths to becoming a scientist in our field. Working with the Chair, Sam Knaus, new ECI definitions were developed:

- * Student ECI Students who are enrolled in an undergraduate, graduate, professional degree, or medical specialty program (e.g., bachelors, masters or PhD student; graduate student; medical student; neurology, neurosurgery or anesthesia resident or trainee; etc.)
- * Scholar ECI Scholars with PhD, MD or equivalent degree who have been in a research training program for less than 5 years since obtaining their last degree (e.g., research fellow; postdoctoral associate; postdoctoral fellow; etc.)

* ECI: Scientists with PhD, MD or equivalent who either (I) have begun independent tracks leading to or with their own groups within the last 6 years (e.g., Assistant Professor; Lecturer; Reader; Docent; Research Scientist), or (2) who are not in an independent track but have begun employment in a research program, typically under the direction of a more senior scientist, within the last 6 years (e.g., staff scientist, research associate).

Note that the term "Junior Member" is defined in our bylaws, so they will have to be amended by the General Assembly of members at BRAIN17 to include these new definitions.

The ECI is also considering a

new initiative, a mentorship program. This would be a long-distance "virtual" program, with the mentor providing networking opportunities, advice about career development, information about research directions, etc. This program will be of special interest to Early Career Investigators working in smaller institutions or who have limited opportunities to attend scientific conferences. This will be discussed during the BRAIN17 meeting.

ISCBFM Program to Support Small Conferences and Courses

The ISCBFM is soliciting applications from active Society members for partial sponsorship of small conferences and courses that are related to the overall scientific goals of the Society and are of potential benefit to its members. These conferences/ courses should be planned for even numbered years so as to not coincide with the biennial BRAIN meetings held in the spring or summer of odd years, or be planned as a satellite just before or after the BRAIN conference. In 2016, the Society

provided support to three conferences/courses:

The International Symposium on Neuroprotection and Neuroprotection and Neurorepair (ISN&N) in Leipzig, The International Symposium on Functional Neuroreceptor Mapping of the Living Brain in Boston, and The PET Pharmacokinetics Course in New Haven, USA.

The Education Committee of ISCBFM conducts the initial review of submitted applications

and then forwards the approved applications to the Executive Committee and Board of Directors for a final decision. Budget requests will be considered for amounts of US\$5,000 - \$30,000.more information and to download an application form, please see our web site:

Dale A. Pelligrino, Ph.D. (1948-2016)



Dale A. Pelligrino, Ph.D., past Secretary of the International Society for Cerebral Blood Flow and Metabolism. died peacefully on August 15, 2016 at his home in Naperville. Illinois. Dale received his Ph.D. (1978) in Physiology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison where he studied cerebral acid-base regulation and respiration under the mentorship of Jerry Dempsey, Ph.D. From 1978-1981, Dale was a post-doctoral fellow in the laboratory of Bo K. Siesjo, M.D., a founding member of the Society for Cerebral Blood Flow and Metabolism. It was during his fellowship in Lund, Sweden that Dale met and fell in love with Yftu, his wife of 35 years. After completion of his post-doctoral studies. Dale returned to the United States where he joined the Department of Anesthesiology, Michael Reese Hospital and Medical Center in Chicago, which was later incorporated into the University of Illinois-Chicago, where Dale advanced to the rank of Research Professor.

Dale had many exciting and productive years studying cerebrovascular and cerebral metabolic regulation, blood-brain barrier transport, and strokerelated brain damage and protection. Throughout his career Dale was funded by the National Institutes of Health and worked for the National Institutes of Health in the capacity as advisor, study section member, and as Chair of the

Brain Injury and Neurovascular Pathology Study Section. Dale was active in numerous scientific societies, but the one nearest and dearest to his heart was the Society of Cerebral Blood Flow and Metabolism. Not only was Dale the Secretary of the Society from 2005 to 2011, but he was also on the Board of Directors, as well as the Editorial Board of the Society's Journal, Journal of Cerebral Blood Flow and Metabolism. Dale was also the local host for the Brain'09 meeting in Chicago. As part of his love for science, Dale thrived on the interactions that came with scientific discussions and dehate

In addition, Dale was a devoted husband, a loving father, and an avid sportsman. In fact, Dale was often accompanied in his world-wide travels by Yftu and their three children. Dale loved any and all sports regardless of whether he was participating or watching. Some of his biggest thrills during each year were the Winter Conference on Brain Research (WCBR)

and its European counterpart, EWCBR. Dale was able to do two of the things that he very much loved, discussing and debating science and skiing. While there were times relegated to the scientific sessions, his discussions would carry over to the chair lift and down the moguls to be recycled ad infinitum once on the chair lift again. Dale made numerous friends throughout the years and loved the social interactions with his fellow scientists. Dale participated in an informal group of cerebrovascular scientists who organized and held parties at the international meetings. These informal gatherings brought together scientists in an interactive and unique forum, that due to Dale's outward going and enthusiastic manner, were muchappreciated by both senior and younger scientists. He will be remembered as a fun-loving and laid back individual on the outside, while on the inside he was very intense and competitive about science and sports. There are many wonderful, funny, and meaningful stories that can be told of Dale. Many of the stories are unbelievable but true. Dale certainly lived life to the fullest. While Dr. Dale Pelligrino left a huge void when he departed, he left an exemplary example and legacy for younger scientists to follow.
